










Is Dublin a good place to study? (Survey Oct 2010)








Digital Dublin (Survey July 2012)








Quality of life in Dublin

71% of respondents indicated that they were happy or very happy with their quality of life right now

Drugs, drink and crime are worst things about Dublin, survey shows

DRUG ABUSE, drink-fuelled antisocial behaviour and crime are the worst things about living in Dublin, a city council survey of more than 2,000 people has found.

The survey, conducted over a three-month period among people living, working or studying in Dublin, showed a positive attitude towards major infrastructural projects such as the Luas, port tunnel and Dublinbikes rental scheme.

Yet dissatisfaction with public transport was ranked as the third worst thing about living in Dublin after issues relating to crime and public order and litter.

An "opinion panel" of 2,300 people representing the greater Dublin population - 86 per cent of whom were Irish and 67 per cent from Dublin - were asked for their views on all aspects of Dublin life.

More than 70 per cent of residents said they would rather live in Dublin than anywhere else in Ireland and almost 90 per cent said Dublin was a good place to work or study. However, fewer than onethird said they felt safe in the city centre at night, and a similar number had negative perceptions of the cleanliness or environmental friendliness of the city.

People were asked to describe. unprompted, the worst thing about Dublin. Fears in relation to the levels of crime and drug and alcohol abuse ranked worst with one in three people surveyed. More than one in six people specifically mentioned drugs or "junkies"

in their responses. Jamie Cudden, research manager with the council, said many panellists reported open drug use was having a serious impact on the image of the city, and they were particularly worried about the number of drug addicts and beggars with babies, the prevalence of drug dealers in tourist areas and the lack of visibility of gardaí.

Dirt was the second worst thing about Dublin and was the greatest concern among almost one in six surveyed. Just under one-third of respondents said the city centre was clean and tidy. When asked to

elaborate people made particular mention of vomit and litter on the 36% streets and a lack of pride among Dubliners in the city's appearance. Dissatisfaction with public transport and traffic came third and

fourth in the list of worst things about Dublin. The lack of infrastructure and integrated public transport systems and the unreliability of public transport were highscheme lighted. However, people expres-sed a high level of satisfaction with existing infrastructure.

The Luas was most popular, with 98 per cent stating it had a positive or very positive impact on the city. The council's Dublinbikes bicycle rental scheme followed closely hehind at 95 per cent satisfaction, while the same percentage said the completion of the M50 was positive or very positive. The port tunnel also had a high posi-

tive rating at 89 per cent In relation to planned projects. the expansion of the bike scheme was the most popular, with 95 per cent support, followed by Metro North at 85 per cent and sourcing water from the Shannon for Dublin at 74 per cent. There was a "lukewarm" reception, Mr Cudden said, to plans for a directly elected mayor, with just 54 per cent of people having a positive reaction to the idea and one in three unsure of what impact it would have.

The opinion panel was asked for suggestions to improve Dublin. While many of these were general focusing on improving safety, the environment and transport, specific suggestions included turning Smithfield plaza into a permanent street market, using vacant buildings as art calleries, and creating a car rental scheme similar to the bike scheme

Drug addicts are blight on city but we love living here

DRUG abuse and "Junkies" nank ahead of dirt as the worst things about living in Dublin, according to families in the capital. In the research by Dublin City Council, respondents cited the number of heroin addicts on the streets as a serious problem. But people like living in Dublin overall, the results published today reveal.

Many of those who participated in the survey "feel that drugs use has had a serious impact on the image of the city centre and is something that needs urgent attention, the council said. Dublin residents are hugely positive about the Luss, with

98pc rating the tram service positively. Similarly high approval ratings were given to dublinbikes (95pc) and the Dublin Fort Tunnel (89pc). Some 85pc of respondents

were also positive about Metro North, while 74pc approved of taking water from the Shannon for the Dublin region. The survey is an initiative of the council's international rela-

tions and research department and was supported by the Dublin Regional Authority as well as the other local authori-

ties in the capital. It was carried out during October to December 2010 among a panel of 2,300 members

Dublin's cosmopolitan nature was reflected in the panel, with more than 60 nationalities represented. Most residents are satisfied

about living in Dublin "The majority felt so strong ly about Dublin that over 70pc would prefer to live in the cap ital than anywhere else in Ireland," the council said. Almost 90nc sold Dublin was a good place to work or study Nevertheless, less than 33pc of respondents felt safe in the city

centre at night. "Some of the worst things about Dublin highlighted included the perception of significant levels of anti-social behaviour, street begging, drink

and drug abuse." Begging was also highlighted as an issue for Dublin in a Herald survey earlier this year. These aspects were identi-fied as a negative by 36pc of

respondents, the local authority added.

RESPONSES

More than one in six mentioned drugs or "junkies" in their responses,

"Other areas of concern were littor/cleanliness/appearance (17pc) and public transport (11pc) were other areas of concern" the council said. Only Ifipe of respondents felt that Dublin is an easy place in which to find a job today.



'Dubliners feel economy is improving but personal finances have not picked up'

- 1417 people responded to the Your Dublin, Your Voice survey, "Getting on in Dublin"
- 55% of respondents felt more confident about the state of the Irish economy compared to one year ago
- 53% actually indicated that they personally were worse off financially than last year.
- Financial pressure was the biggest worry for 42% of respondents, followed by work / job security (17%) and health (13%)


